

ALFRED LeROY JOHNSON, D.M.D., D.Sc.

Born in Massachusetts, about 1885.

Received his degree in 1904 from Tufts College Dental School, Boston,

Took a post-graduate course in 1909 at the Angle School of Orthodontists.

Has two Honorary degrees: one from Tufts, and one from Harvard.

After several years of practice, he became Professor of Orthodontics successively at Tufts College Dental School, the University of Michigan, and the University of Pennsylvania, from 1918-1927.

From 1931-1939, he was a Research Associate in the Department of Anatomy in experimental Genetics at the Cornell Medical School.

He Came to Harvard in 1942 as Professor of Clinical Dentistry.

In 1944, he was appointed as Administrative Officer of Harvard's new School of Dental Medicine, and Associate Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, from which he resigned on November 1, 1946.

He is a member of the American Association of Orthodontists, the Southern Society of Orthodontists, New York, and the Southwestern Society of Orthodontists.

His articles, from 1927-1948 include:

- "The constitutional factor in skull form and dental occlusion"
- "The utilization of biologic principles in the study and treatment of malocclusion"
- "Studies in genetics of interest to the orthodontist"
- "Occlusion and etiologic factor in periodontal lesions"

— a great many others were written in the earlier years from 1911 on.
