



GLENN THOMPSON MITTON, D.D.S., D.D.P.H.

Born in Blenheim, Ontario, where he attended Public and High Schools. He graduated from the Royal College of Dental Surgeons in 1923.

Practised until 1935 in St. Thomas, Ontario, where he took part in community life. He served four years on the Board of Education, and was Chairman of the Board in his final year. While at St. Thomas, he interested the Kiwanis Club in starting a school dental service, later taken over by the city. He served in this club as secretary, Chairman of the Speaker's Committee, and as President of the Club.

In 1935, he came to Toronto and began practising there until Nov. 8, 1939. He became a member of the Dental Public Health Committee of the Academy of Dentistry, Toronto, and again took an active part in promoting School Dental Services - this time in North York.

Having served in World War 1, he went into the Dental Corps in World War II for six years, three years of which he was overseas. For one year he was in charge of Dental Services for the Royal Canadian Navy in Great Britain, and was stationed at the R.C.N. Hospital at Greenock, Scotland. He retired from the Army as a Major.

For the next two years he worked with Dr. Harold Skilling in the School Dental Services in East York, and did the School Dental Survey in Forest Hill Village, Toronto.

He Graduated in Dental Public Health from the School of Hygiene in 1948, and came on the staff of the Faculty of Dentistry, U. of T., as head of the Dental Public Health Department immediately afterward, and remained in charge of Dental Public Health field work on a half time basis.

He became Secretary of the Ont. D. Assoc. in 1946.
