## All about e-books

### Finding e-books

Do you know that besides searching the library catalogue for e-books (using the refine results function), you have two other options to find them? Here is how:

#### \* By subject

We are very excited to announce that in order to make it easier for our users to locate E-books, we have created a [Dentistry E-Books](#) by subject webpage. This page is located at the centre of the [library homepage](#) below the library catalogue. Now you can get a list of e-books by subject just by clicking on the link beside it.

#### \* By different e-book platform

The lists below are some major platforms for dentistry related e-books, you can search each one for certain titles or you can use the following methods to get a list of all dentistry related books:

- \* [MyiLibrary](#) - use "Browse by Subject", "Dentistry" is under "Medicine".
- \* [Scholars Portal Books](#) - use Dent\* to do a subject search.
- \* [Ebrary](#) - select "All Subjects" beside the search box, "Dentistry" is under "Medicine".
- \* [SpringerLink](#) - select "Browse by collection", "Dentistry" is under "Medicine".

### Using e-books

While different e-book platforms may have their own unique features, they all have some common functions over print books: 24/7 access, search, create your personal online library, and write notes anywhere etc. However, please be aware that because of copyright/legal arrangements between vendors and publishers, all of these platforms have some restrictions for users to download, print or copy e-books. Please check the "Permitted Uses" links in each item record for more detailed information.

### Prospero - international register of systematic reviews

[PROSPERO](#) Launched in Feb 2011 is an international collaborative project led by NIHR's Centre for Reviews and Dissemination (CRD). It is the first free online facility to allow researchers planning to conduct systematic reviews to register their study protocols in advance from all around the world. PROSPERO was aimed to encourage worldwide sharing of information and collaboration, meanwhile to avoid biases of systematic review, unintended duplication of efforts etc. For more information please refer to [an article](#) published in BMJ or check this short [YouTube video](#).

### Catalog of Surveys and Archive of Procedures Related to Oral Health - USA

Are you wondering where you can find information on the methods and procedures for collecting oral health data? Or reports from analyses of those data? Please check two searchable free online databases from Dental, Oral and Craniofacial Data Resource Center (DRC): [Catalog of Surveys Related to Oral Health](#) and [Archive of Procedures and Methods Used in Oral Health Surveys](#): The Catalog includes federal, state, international, and privately sponsored surveys and other datasets; The archive contains clinical indices, questionnaires, and other methods of measuring oral health. "The Catalog and Archive database provides a central and up-to-date resource for detailed descriptions of oral health data sources for public health research, program planning, and policymaking".
